Mayor's Message

LaFayette, Ind., Dec. 31, 1910.

To the Council of the City of LaFayette, Ind.:

Gentlemen:—The State of Indiana by Legislative enactment instructs the Mayor of its municipalities to report once each year to your honorable body the financial condition of the city, consequently I herewith submit to you a report of the different funds of the city, showing the amount on hand today with all bills paid as follows:

General Fund	\$26,071.71
Park Fund	2,816.81
Water Works Fund	30,210.46
Library Fund	1,678.13
Sinking Fund (to retire city bonded debt).....	26,421.33
Total carried over in all funds.....	\$87,198.44

The above does not include the contractors' and bondholders' funds, which I omit for the reason that on them the city has no ownership.

One year ago I recommended (and in which you heartily concurred) the buying of ground in the vicinity of Wabash avenue for a play ground for the children of that neighborhood. Up to this time the Board of Public Works has not been able to obtain the consent of the owner of the grounds to a purchase of the same, which you, by ordinance, selected. After a careful consideration of the plans submitted for the beautifying of the river front, I am satisfied that the consumation of such plans would be too expensive and believe we should look to less expensive plans. In this connection I would say that the city has recently obtained from the Government at Washington, D. C., the right to erect between the Main and Brown street bridges a stone wall at low water mark so that all obstacles so far as the Washington Government is concerned, is removed. I further request your advice in the way of beautifying the river front.

Comptroller's Report

Department of Finance

Office of City Comptroller, LaFayette, Ind., Jan. 1, 1911.

To the Mayor and Common Council:

Gentlemen:—In compliance with the law, I herewith present to you a report of the finances of the city for the year ending December 31, 1910. Also a detailed report of work done in each of the departments.

The financial condition of the city is good, the only indebtedness at the present is the Water Works bonds of \$300,000.

The Sinking Fund created in 1907 to retire this debt, was a wise provision and should have been provided for years ago, over \$650,000 has been paid in interest, without reducing the original amount a dollar. The Sinking Fund has on hand Dec. 31, 1910, \$26,421.33. At the time of the bonds maturing it will be possible to reduce this bonded indebtedness a considerable amount.

The levy for running the City Government previous to 1905, was \$1.00 on the hundred dollars for a number of years. Since 1905, it has been gradually reduced, at present it is 85c, this reduction has been a saving to the tax payers of this city of more than \$80,000, at the same time every department in the city has increased its efficiency.

Many permanent improvements have been made. Salaries of Police, Fire Department, Street Department and Water Works Department increased to meet the high cost of living.

I desire to call your attention to the reports of the different departments. You can readily see how and where the money appropriated is spent.

The tax levy is made of the following funds: The General or Corporation fund, Park fund, Library fund and Sinking fund, and for the year 1910, totals 99c, divided as follows: General fund, 85c; Park, 5c; Library, 4c; Sinking fund, 5c, or one cent more than the previous year, caused by the School Board raising the Library levy from 3c to 4c.

Out of the General fund comes all expenses for running the City Government, the others are special funds and can only be used for the purposes levied.

During the year 1910, the city paid \$10,000.00 to complete the Central Fire Station, purchased a Motor Cycle for the Police Department at a cost of \$225.00 and built a new barn on the city lot costing \$600.00. A total of \$15,554.24 for unusual expenditures for the year 1910.

With every bill against the city paid, ample provisions made for

the expenses of running the City Government for the year 1911, the city has a surplus in the General Fund of \$26,071.71.

The Contractors' and Bondholders' fund is made up from the cost of public improvements (streets, sewers, alleys, sidewalks, etc.) Whenever a public improvement is ordered, the contract let, and the work accepted the owner has the privilege of paying the amount assessed against the property in cash within thirty days or filing a waiver, taking the ten year payments.

All money paid within the thirty days goes to the contractor.

Bonds are issued for those who waiver, and the bonds delivered to the contractor. All of the money paid for public improvements goes to the contractor and bondholder.

No. 9. AN ORDINANCE making an additional appropriation for the use of the department of Metropolitan Police as follows:

No. 17. AN ORDINANCE locating and establishing a public park on the East bank of the Wabash River in the City of LaFayette, Indiana from the South line of Brown street to the North line of the right of way of the Lake Erie and Western railway where it crosses said river.

No. 18. AN ORDINANCE transferring funds from the Crematory Fund to the Miscellaneous Fund of the Inspector of scales, weights and measures.

No. 19. AN ORDINANCE making a transfer of certain funds in the Department of Public Works.

No. 20. AN ORDINANCE making an appropriation for the redemption of certificates heretofore issued by the City of LaFayette, for the improvement of street intersections.

Dear Sir:—I herewith submit to you my annual report of the condition of affairs in the Department of Law for the year ending to-day, as follows:

The City of Lafayette vs. The Wabash Railroad company, No. 6,695, and the City of Lafayette vs. The Wabash Railroad company, No. 6,696, and The City of Lafayette vs. The Chicago, Indianapolis and Louisville Railroad company, all pending in the Circuit Court of this county, are all old cases growing out of the assessment by the City of certain lands belonging to the defendants for the construction of cement walks, the railroad companies having appealed from the action of the Common Council's action. Bonds were issued to the contractor under the law then in force regulating such matters, and these bonds have not matured. By agreement of all parties these cases are to be allowed to stand until such time as all matters can be settled at once, so as to avoid a multiplicity of suits.

The history of this case, showing its origin before a justice of the peace to this City, judgment in favor of plaintiff, appeal to the Circuit Court, change of venue from this to Clinton county, trial there and disagreement of the jury trying the same, has heretofore been reported to you. At the time of my last report to you this cause was still pending in the Circuit Court of Clinton county. It was afterward set for trial when plaintiff dismissed his action. This was the last damage suit filed against the City of Lafayette, and its dismissal leaves the city at this time without a damage suit against it, and, so far as I am aware, without any one having a right of action against it.

SUITS NOW PENDING.

The City of Lafayette.

vs.

William H. Randolph,
John E. Chamberlin,
Charles T. Bartee, and

This is a suit to collect the balance due from the defendant, William H. Randolph, on his contract with the City of Lafayette for the refreshment privileges of Columbian Park, for the year 1909, the other defendants being his sureties on a bond given by him to secure the performance of his contract.

This is a cause now pending in the Circuit Court of Clinton county, wherein a writ of mandate is sought to compel the defendant, who collects the taxes levied by the City of Lafayette, to deposit the taxes so collected in the public depositories of the city as soon as collected, instead of holding the money until the time of his semi-annual settlement with the State of Indiana. This suit was originally filed in the Circuit Court of this county, and to relator's petition defendant demurred for want of facts. This demurrer was sustained by the Court, whereupon the relator amended its petition and asked a change of venue from the county, and the cause was sent to the Circuit Court of Clinton county. To relator's amended petition defendant demurred, and after argument the Court overruled the demurrer. Defendant then filed his answer in two paragraphs, the first a general denial, the second setting up affirmative matter as a defense. Defendant then asked a change of venue from the Court, and Hon. Dallas S. Holman was appointed as special judge in the case. To defendant's second paragraph of answer relator demurred for want of facts, and upon argument its demurrer was sustained. On account of personal matters claiming his time Judge Holman declined to act further in the matter, and Hon. Jere West, Judge of the Montgomery Circuit Court, was agreed upon to preside at the trial of this cause. Up to the present time Judge West has been so occupied with the business of his own court that he could not hear the trial, but I hope to be able to get a hearing at an early date.

This also is an application for a writ of mandate against the defendant, to require him to file a bond to secure the safe keeping of all money collected by him for the relator. The suit was filed in the Superior Court of the county, and to relator's petition defendant filed a demurrer, which demurrer the Court sustained. Relator refused to amend or to plead further, and the Court rendered judgment upon the pleadings, in favor of the defendant. From this judgment the relator appealed to the Supreme Court of Indiana, where the cause is now pending, awaiting decision by that Court.

During the year two claims for the return of taxes erroneously as-

essed and collected, that of George P. Haywood, executor of Anna M. Max, deceased, in the sum of \$223.06, and that of Thomas B. Gullefer, in the sum of \$123.12, have been adjusted and paid.

No franchises have been granted during the year. The penal ordinances of the City have been well observed, as a rule, and it has been found necessary to prosecute for but two violations.

Nearly three years ago the City of Lafayette took the lead in an effort to protect property interests from damage and children from injuries resulting from the use of fire crackers and other explosives. The example thus set has been followed by many cities since, and the results are extremely gratifying. In the enforcement of the local ordinance I believe that the greatest effort should be made to enforce that provision which forbids the sale of such articles, rather than against the users of them. Very naturally, the dealer is the prime offender, and he is more readily reached because he is less numerous. A further reason for placing the greater responsibility upon the dealer is in the fact that the users of these articles are mostly children, most of whom have not yet reached the age of discretion and who are not qualified to judge as to what is for their own good. As a rule, the merchants of Lafayette have been ready and willing to co-operate with the city officials in the enforcement of this ordinance, and during the first year of its operation the authorities, in order to permit dealers to dispose of stocks of goods on hand at the time of its enactment, were lenient, permitting them to sell in cases where the articles were not to be used within the city. Some of these merchants have had suspiciously large stocks of goods on hand, as the same plea was urged again last year. It seems to me that all the merchants of Lafayette have had ample time to dispose of any reasonable amount of fire works, and that hereafter the seller of all such articles as are by this ordinance forbidden to be sold in Lafayette should be deemed the real offender and prosecuted to the fullest extent. The freedom from fires, and the consequent saving of property, in all cities where the sale of fire works is forbidden is most encouraging and is a strong argument in favor of the enforcement of all such ordinances. But a still more forcible argument in favor of the ordinance is that the children of the community should be protected from the acts of adult men whose avarice and cupidity are so great that they are willing to make outlaws of themselves for the sake of the profit they may make out of the pennies they can coax from babes.

So far as I am aware, there are no judgments outstanding against the City of Lafayette, and none in its favor.

Board of Public Works

To the City Comptroller, His Honor, the Mayor, and Gentlemen of the Common Council of the City of Lafayette, Indiana.

Gentlemen:—We herewith submit to you the report of the various departments under the Board of Public Works and ask for it your careful consideration.

WATER DEPARTMENT.

At the close of business December 31, 1910, the water department finished its most successful year and we call your attention to the increase in receipts and the balance on hand at close of year.

The consumption of water having very materially increased it will be necessary to look up an additional supply that we may at all times have an abundance of good wholesome water. The Board has under consideration the sinking of a test well near the pump house and if the water is satisfactory as to quality and quantity, to follow it with a number of wells that we may be able to get the supply and avoid the laying of an additional suction line to the river.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Central House was finished during the last summer and the chemical apparatus from number two and ladder truck from number one moved into it, we regret very much the change of heart on the consolidation of number one and two in the Central House. We wish to call your attention to the fact that the business portion of the city is as poorly protected as ever owing to the lack of equipment at the Central House. We trust that you will reconsider this matter, we have been very fortunate in the past, and we have the right to expect the same in the future?

STREET DEPARTMENT.

The streets rebuilt with crushed stone the past year are holding up well, but think it will be necessary to coat them with oil to lay the dust the coming summer on South Ninth street, the property owners are paying for cement curb and gutter and have deposited with the clerk a sufficient amount of money to furnish an asphalt binder to use with the stone it is expected to make of this street one as free from dust as an asphalt street, we regret that owing to the street car company having to relay their tracks this work could not be finished before winter set in.

The present system of cleaning paved streets is out of date and

very unsanitary as the fine dust is not removed and is a source of nuisance and great damage to stocks of merchandise, we suggest a change from the present white wings to the slushing wagons.

During the last summer we tried slushing the streets with hose, but found it very slow and expensive and very wasteful of water. With a slushing wagon 600 gallon will clean about 750 feet of street and clean it perfectly.

The collection of garbage the past year has been very successful. We had a few complaints, which, upon investigation, proved to be easily remedied. The furnace has been thoroughly overhauled and the building given needed repairs. We would again recommend for your consideration the collection of ashes on same plan as garbage is collected and thereby do away with the unsightly pile of ashes in back yards. It could be done by this department at a moderate cost, are reason for again calling your attention to this matter, is the fact that the city, through its street department hauls the greater part of it anyhow and it interferes very materially with the spring cleaning of streets and alleys as many people do not get it out until the cleaning gang has passed and it is necessary to go over much of the ground the second time.

INSPECTOR OF SCALES, WEIGHTS AND MEASURES.

In view of the River front improvement the Board has made satisfactory arrangement for the removal of city scales to a plot of ground between Columbia and Main streets, Tennessee and Water streets. A new building has been erected with a large and comfortable office for city sealer of weights and measures. It will be necessary to do a little grading and leveling as soon as weather will permit to finish this, and it will be an ideal hay market.

PARK DEPARTMENT.

The attendance at Columbian Park the past season was the largest in the history of the park. The concerts by the full band of twenty pieces were attended by crowds that proved the money for concerts was well spent.

The swimming pool, though built in 1906, drew crowds larger than ever. It is the intention of the Board to operate it under the same rules as before, reserving Tuesday and Friday afternoons for ladies' day.

The Zoo department is growing nicely, three more pits have been added to the bear pits making five pits in all. The yard in front of the bear pits have been enlarged five feet.

A new monkey house twenty feet square and twelve feet high was erected and a pair of Baboons put in. The Badgar pen, Prairie dog pen and Armadilla pen have been improved with modern and ornamental roofs. The animals and fowls are in fine condition.

The Zoo part of the park is in much need of a winter house for animals and fowls that cannot stand this climate during the winter. The means at the disposal of the Board would not permit of taking up this

improvement as amount raised from tax levy, together with revenues, just about takes care of current expenses.

We respectfully ask a careful consideration of the report of the different departments.
